Data, Strategies, Outcomes

COMMON VIOLATIONS

- Minor in Possession of/Consuming Alcohol or Marijuana
- Fraudulent Identification Prohibited
- Noise
- Nuisance Party
- Miscellaneous others

NOISE/ NUISANCE PARTY VIOLATIONS

Used as a proxy for quality-of-life (QOL) violations committed by young adults

Not exclusively committed by young adults

But most offenders are aged 18 to 25

Mostly occur in areas with dense student housing

Excludes Disrupting Quiet Enjoyment of the Home

• Since DQE includes offenders of many ages, addresses

Data is measured the same way year over year

Noise/Nuisance Party Violations by Academic Year



CASE PROCESS

- Violation occurs
- Citation issued
- Offender appears in court
 - Within 7-10 days during August/September
 - Within 2-3 weeks other times of year
- Plea offer is made by prosecutor
- Case is resolved through disposition, trial, or dismissal
 - But very few trials or dismissals



Case Outcomes

Most Resolved with a Deferred Judgment

- Guilty plea is entered
- Case dismissed after 1 year if sanctions completed


Common Sanctions

- Costs and fees
- Restorative Justice through CURJ, Community Mediation Services
 - Results in a contract with additional action items
- Community Living Class (CU offenders only)
- Community Service

Student Conduct also addresses QOL violations

Fraternities Present Special Challenges

- Difficult to track violations because sometimes issued to officers
- Leadership changes mid-year, so learning (e.g., CURJ, CLC) is lost
- No apparent methodology for institutional learning
- Sanctions are often experienced most heavily by the most responsible members (leadership)
- GOOD NEWS: IFC on the Hill has become very involved in holding fraternities accountable beyond what occurs in court

New Noise Ordinance (effective 9-1-2022)

15 Noise citations written

- 11 to Young Adults; 3 to fraternities
- Represent 12 incidents
- All but one occurred on the Hill


Time of incident

- 4 incidents occurred between 11 pm and 7 am (old ordinance)
- 8 incidents occurred between 7 am and 11 pm (new ordinance)


MIP (Minor in Possession of Alcohol/Marijuana)

- Took over from state court in 2011
- Made multiple improvements that reduced recidivism
- Partner with CU for treatment, Community Service
- Filings drastically reduced beginning Fall 2021
 - CU stopped issuing citations for 1st time, on-campus violations
 - Now handled exclusively on campus
- We still adjudicate the following:
 - Violations not committed by CU students
 - Off-campus violations committed by CU students
 - o 2nd and subsequent on-campus violations committed by CU students
